We want to acknowledge that the Porcupine River watershed is situated on Treaty #9 territory and on the traditional territory of Indigenous Nations including the Mushkegowuk (Cree), Anishinabewaki and Métis. We cannot talk about water health, environment, and conservation without recognizing the insight, and the history of caretaking by the Indigenous Nations and the need to include their voices in conservation discussions and decisions.

Our thoughts are with all those touched by the devastating discovery of the remains of 215 children at a former Kamloops residential school. We grieve with all those whose lives have been deeply impacted, and are still impacted today, by the irreparable damages inflicted by the residential schools and other destructive and prejudicial systemic practices. Let's pause and listen.

FPRW iNaturalist project: 1170 observations. 560 species. Beauty all around us!

Our iNaturalist project has now been active for 1 year! Launched in June 2020, it now contains over 1170 past and current observations comprising of over 560 species of living plants, wildlife, insects and more! This compilation is possible because community members like you have taken the time to

explore and photograph fauna and flora within the watershed area and submitted the photos to iNaturalist.

Submitting your sightings is easy and can be done through the iNaturalist App or website. Even if you are unsure of the correct identification, other knowledgeable iNaturalist users will add their input to your observation. We all help each other out and we learn so much!

We invite you to explore the project page and to go out and submit your sightings this summer. Whether they are creatures as big as a moose or as small as a tiny caterpillar, knowing more about the biodiversity that relies on the watershed's healthy ecosystem to survive is fascinating!
