We cannot talk about water health, environment, and conservation without recognizing the insight and the history of caretaking by the Indigenous Nations and the need to include their voices in conservation discussions and decisions.

As we approach the end of 2021, we'd like to take a few moments to let our members know what we've been up to. The past 2 years have had its share of obstacles and haven't been ideal for community events, but we are still working together for a healthier

watershed!

During the past year, we built a new strategic plan to guide our actions and priorities, we held litter awareness initiatives, and we continued advocating for the watershed alongside various stakeholders through our participation in the Porcupine Watershed's Public Liaison Committee (PLC). Here are a few current and ongoing items:

- We continue to advocate for a cessation of the bypasses (*discharge of wastewater*) in Porcupine Lake. Despite the new extension granted to the City of Timmins for the tanks at Pumping Station no.4, we hope that the January 2022 deadline will be achievable and that the system will be fully functional.
- We are currently waiting for further fish testing in some of the watershed lakes after the MECP's findings of elevated mercury and chromium in Porcupine Lake's fish species in 2019. (For more details, visit the Fish Advisory links on our website)
- Public awareness of safe/unsafe swimming and fish consumption conditions is a priority

and we continue to support proper signage at key locations. Public awareness of future discharges is also important, and the City has pledged to make every bypass public on their website.

- * We are currently advocating for the restoration of the old Ratcliff Airway Inc. property situated next to the historic Airport Hotel on the shore of Porcupine Lake and hope to convert it into an accessible fishing platform, along with other trail improvements.
- * Our FPRW iNaturalist project is growing. With 1360 observations totalling 645 different species, this data collection is helping us learn about the rich biodiversity within our watershed! We invite
